"In Short, I am an artist by heart, a business graduate by education and an entrepreneur by nature", says Jhansi.

In the last 10 years of her journey as an artist, she has experimented several mediums (including oils, acrylics, charcoal and mixed media), participated in 10+ international art shows and holds a world record for creating India's largest Maze Art She is also a co-founder of an art startup – KalaPrayas(democratizing creativity!) and has spoken at several international conferences including Harvard Asia Conference and TEDx.

"Having grown up in Kolkata during my formative age, I have been exposed to rich culture and vibrant creative ecosystem early on, in life. However, lack of enough supporting ground for creative professionals and

uncertainties associated, especially in the Indian setting, made me choose a mainstream academic career.

my MBA at the Indian School of Business, I decided to democratize arts and creativity through my art startup KalaPrayas", she says. Though started as a marketplace for affordable art, KalaPrayas spread into several other spaces - B2B art sales, innovation consulting, creative marketing, art investment advisory and studio renting for experimental art. At one point, KalaPrayas connected 200+ artists, produced/sold 500+ artworks, partnered with dozen firms and generated an economic activity worth 80KS. "At KalaPrayas, I could also experiment and reverse engineer technology into arts to create interesting projects like "Smart" art and find business application for creativity", Jhansi adds.


Most of her inspirations are drawn from her travel episodes. She loves to travel, experience new cultures and draw inspirations, and is also deeply influenced by music and loves to tune into Indian classical.





LARGEST HAND-DRAWN MAZE

Lasya Madireddy and Jhansi Munukoti jointly drew a maze of 320 sq ft (5.5 ft x 58.5 ft) in 16 hours (10 hr on day 1 and 6 hr on day 2) during the Design Summit 2015 conducted by HYSEA (Hyderabad Software Engineers Association) at the Hyderabad International Convention Centre (HICC), Hyderabad on March 11 and 12, 2015. Characterised by a start and end point, the maze art is an artwork that is also a fully solvable puzzle. Marker pens were used to draw the maze and acrylic colours were used in specific locations just to highlight specific elements.

Hyderabad techies create India's largest hand-drawn maze

Two IT professionals from the city made India's largest hand-drawn maze at Design Summit 2015, held at the Hyderabad International Convention Centre on March 11 and 12.

Lasya Madireddy and Jhansi Munukoti created a hand-drawn maze of 300 sq. ft. in 16 hours.

They have applied to the Limca Book of World Records.

The maze, six-feet long and 55-feet wide, was created live at the Design Summit organised by HYSEA (Hyderabad Software Exporters Association) and attended by the Governor E.S.L. Narasimhan.

A maze is a culmination of design, logic and art, where there is a start and an end point, where a solver has to manoeuvre through 300 sq.ft.

The duo used over 100 markers of various types and colours and paint to highlight elements of design embedded in the maze and 16 hours of thought process to create the intricate maze.

JHANSI NAGA KUMARI MUNUKOTI

A student from Indian School of Business, Jhansi has also won a place in the Limca Book of World Records for her 320 sq. ft. hand-drawn maze painting at the Design Summit 2015 in Hyderabad. She has also won an award for the best 3D model in Global Social Venture Competition - 2010, conducted by the University of California. Jhansi experiments with clay, mixed medium and a lot of abstract style. "I would be representing as a designer who supports women empowerment, my theme being "Women and her inner self, Navrasas." she said. Jhansi is also co-founder of Kalaprayas, an organization which helps generate the need of art, and also gives good artists from villages a much needed break and exposure.



Shruti graduated from Istituto Europeo di Design, Milan, Italy in fashion and textile design. She lived in Mumbai for two years and later moved back to Hyderabad and started her own brand 'Selvaggio Moda by Shruti Chopra'. "I recently visited Greece, Athens and Santorini and fortunately Arture happened. My collection called 'DEA' – a Greek goddess is inspired by the places I visited, with hues of blue and white." It took Shruti only two months to create her collection. The designers may not know each other on personal level, but a string that binds them together is the joy of representing Hyderabad on a global platform.



JAYA BAHETI

Born and brought up in Pune, Jaya holds a bachelor's degree in fine arts from the Pune University. When she relocated to Hyderabad 24 years ago, Jaya found the city to be laid back, warm, and brimming with culture and old world charm. "Hyderabad is an inspiring city, and that perhaps reflects in my paintings too." Passionately experimenting on different mediums, Jaya believes art has no boundaries. "It can be on a myriad of surfaces, my journey began from paper to canvas to couture and artifacts." Revealing more about her collection for the London and Cambridge shows, Jaya says, "One painting is one saree, so I have 15 silk saree editions and 15 stoles. I have bags, jewellery and a sandook too as part of my collection," adding that the collection took six months of passionate work. "Each person who has brought my painting, saree or stole has got a part of myself with them," she said. Interestingly, her theme is religiously rebellious. "I consider my paintings my religion. My mother-in-law gifted me a studio seeing my passion. I have experimented and shifted to different surfaces and have rebelled, thus I call myself religiously rebellious."

An effort to keep art alive amid humdrum lifestyles

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Reproduction of perception is what differentiates human beings from animals, and drawing of images is one such art. Though art traces its history back to the evolution of human beings, the subsequent economic activity resulted in people being segregated by vocation, thus rendering artists as a separate clan.

The primordial urge, nevertheless, is revisiting many. Quite a few professionals from various fields are choosing to escape into a world of canvas and colours after their mundane engagement with the external world.

A few such amateur artists have come together to found KalaPrayas, a virtual art studio, (www.wix.com/kalaprayas/website), with the aim of "keeping the passion for art alive amidst the chaos of professional chores". Over a year

into its birth, KalaPrayas, translated as 'Art Effort', has already organised two exhibitions, albeit in residential complexes.

"Initially, the group began with four people. Now we are 15 from diverse backgrounds bound by our penchant for art. By forming a network, we aim to learn from one another and improve our skills," says Jhansi Munukoti, a software engineer working with Oracle. Jhansi learnt art while she was schooling in Kolkata, but left the canvas as college education became more demanding. Once she finished education and got the job, she revived her interest and took to brush.

Siliveri Lavanya, Jhansi's colleague, has been painting since childhood. Though she does not possess any certificate in art, she is an expert with water colours, poster colours, and oils. Pavan Kumar, however, is a full-time artist and his tutoring is pivotal to the group's learning. The group members variedly experiment with murals, oil paintings, Tanjore paintings, fabric designing, Madhubani paintings, decorative pots, portraits, acrylics, water colours, abstracts, and also sculpting. Being in the group makes it easier for individual artists to exhibit their works, as they find hardly any time to visit galleries and negotiate a show. The group, incidentally, is organising a full-scale show at the State Gallery of Fine Arts, Kavuri Hills, from June 10 to 12, where nearly 50 works will be on display.

"We are looking for more likeminded people to come and join us. Even those with no initiation, but a flair for learning are welcome. We provide them with the required guidance," assures Jhansi. Only last week, two IT professionals from Hyderabad created a record where there was none, and attempted to break a world record - all in one go.

Techies Jhansi Munukoti and Lasya Madireddi created a hand-drawn maze of 300 sq. ft. in 16 hours at Design Summit 2015, held at the Hyderabad International Convention Centre on March 11 and 12. This is a record in India, and the duo have applied for a world record status to the Limca Book of World Records.

Jhansi explains. "Learning typically happens by solving other people's mazes. Whenever a maze artist solves a maze, he/she understands how the artist built his blocks, what techniques he/she used, the branching etc. It is a very, very small group of people around the world," she says.

"Unfortunately, it is a dying art, so getting a platform like this (the Design Summit 2015) is good for the art, as it inspires others to take it up. It is experience that gives insights into what branches to open up, what techniques to use etc," she adds.

The event, however, did manage to give the artists from the city an audience that was initially lukewarm, but soon warmed up as the

While solving mazes might be a popular educational and recreational tool among kids, maze-drawing is an art form which is heard less of. That someone would harbour such interests beyond a certain age is also quite uncommon.

Not true for Lasya and Jhansi, though.

"As a child, one has interests in doodling and stuff and as one grows, one's logic also grows. So, it is a combination of art and logic. I have been doing it from the last ten years. All thanks to a horrible math teacher that I had, who drove me into using my brains in a better manner," says Lasya, breaking into a giggle.

For Jhansi, maze-drawing is only one of the several art forms she practises.

She says, "I' m into all kinds of art - painting, portraits, caricatures etc. So, maze-drawing is only an extension of my love for art."

However, by their own admission, maze-drawing fails to get much traction over the world. There are less than 50 hand-drawn maze artists in the world. In India, the number of such maze artists is in single digits.

For practitioners of such an art form, it often proves difficult to find an audience and a guru as well. With computers generated mazes taking minutes to churn out intricate pieces of work, hand-drawn mazes seem to be losing favour.

magnanimity of a world record being scripted right in front of their eyes dawned upon them.

Curious onlookers hung around to figure out what the furious scribbling was all about. Soon, the response turned into a 'rage', much to the surprise of the artists themselves.

"The response has been awesome. It has been a rage," says Jhansi.

However, Lasya adds a caveat. "But, to be very blunt, in India people just say 'wow' when they see you drawing a maze, but sadly nobody sees the logic involved. I do not have Indian solvers for my toughest mazes," she says.

"You need people to get involved in it. I have solvers from Kazakhstan, Pakistan, the US. From the perspective of appreciating hand-drawn mazes, I

think Kazakhstan is the best country. They always get back with solutions within hours," she adds.

Lasya and Janshi do not have a Facebook page for promoting their work online, often seen as a bare minimum necessity. They chose emails and their personal Facebook profiles instead to make their work reach out to a greater audience.

Within the community of maze artists too, email is used as powerful tool to share work and collaborate.

"We are a very close-knit community where we mail each other our mazes. We try and solve each other's mazes. It is a collaborative thing," says Jhansi.

They also often participate in weekend events of Hyderabad's very vibrant socio-cultural circles to showcase their work. In fact, the two had met at a similar event two years ago and decided to work together. However, online collaboration remains the best ways to share tricks and to learn.


The artist-duo expects to hear back from Limca on the confirmation of a new world record by June this year. For now, it is nervous anticipation for them.




